

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How Things Work Now:

Who receives school meals at no cost?

- Students who meet certain criteria.
 - Income-based eligibility: \$51,338 for a household of 4
- Any child who attending a Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) school.
 - Over 2.7M students attend a CEP school across 3,000+ NY schools

How are school meals funded?

- All meals served must meet federal nutrition guidelines to receive reimbursement.
- Schools receive state and federal funding for each breakfast & lunch served.

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The Problem:

- 1 in 5 New York households with children are food insecure
- 800,000+ students will lose access to free school meals on June 30, 2022
- Cost can be a barrier

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- Low-income students experience shame and stigma
- Historic low participation in school meal programs, especially school breakfast



The Solution:

Healthy School Meals for All (HSMFA) NYS Kids

- Ensure a healthy meal at no cost to every NYS student, every school day.
- Ensure schools provide meals through the federal National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs to maintain high quality school meals.

Robust body of research show HSMFA is a win-win for students, families, and schools:

• Eliminate stigma and shame

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- Provide a significant financial relief for families
- Improve school nutrition finances to allow investments in quality

Households with students attending CEP schools were nearly



compared to households with students attending a school eligible for, but not participating in CEP.



Healthy School Meals for All NYS Kids: Campaign Goals & Principles

Campaign Goal:

• New York State must establish and fund a permanent, statewide program to provide a nutritionally-adequate breakfast and lunch each day, at no direct charge to students, regardless of their household income.

Core Principles:

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- HSMFA NY Kids campaign and policy solution must be respectful, equitable, and systemic, so we will work together to ensure that:
 - School meals are accessible to every student.
 - The collection of income information from families will not be tied to school meals.
- We believe the state revenue source for HSMFA NY Kids should not be regressive and will not require a cut to other important programs.



Healthy School Meals for All NY Kids: The Policy Proposal

Designed to build on the foundations of the federal National School Lunch Program (NSLP) and the School Breakfast Program (SBP), the pillars of policy proposal include:

- 1. Provide two meals (breakfast and lunch) for all children each school day, regardless of household income.
- 2. Ensure nutritious meals: Schools must serve USDA reimbursable meals through NSLP and SBP.
- 3. Increase the State's supplemental meal reimbursement: The state will cover the cost of meals not covered by the federal government.
- Maximize federal reimbursement: To minimize cost to the state, eligible schools will be required to participate in a federal provision and all schools must support SNAP outreach efforts.



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Healthy School Meals for All NY Kids: The Cost

Cost of Program:

- The cost of this policy is equal to the cost of filling the gap between "free" and "paid" reimbursement rates.
- Based on 2021-2022 SY rates, the state would need to contribute the following:
 - Lunch: \$3.31 per lunch served
 - Breakfast: \$2.02 per breakfast served
- Impact on current CEP schools: CEP schools would receive state funds for all meals reimbursed at paid rate.

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The Pandemic Changed... Everything

- COVID-19 highlighted the critical role of school meals for students
- Providing meals to kids during school closures was a key component of our country's pandemic response
- Serving meals at no charge for 2+ years served as a trial run for School Meals for All policies

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Survey Results Confirm Benefits

The School Nutrition Association conducted a survey and found that school meal program directors across the country reported that serving free meals to all students during the pandemic

- increased access
- improved equity
- fueled a large decrease in unpaid meal debt





Healthy School Meals for All Maryland

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State Momentum:

During the FY 2022-2023 state budget cycle:

- More than 150 leading health, education, and anti-hunger organizations signed on to our letter advocating for Healthy School Meals for All NY Kids.
- NYS Educational Conference Board released a position paper in support.
- Senator Michelle Hinchey and Assemblymember Jessica González-Rojas introduced bills that would establish healthy school meals for all.

Looking ahead to the FY 2023-2024 budget, we must maintain – and grow – this strong, multi-sector coalition.

• Summer 2022:

- Launch & grow statewide campaign
- Submit proposal to Governor Hochul's office

• Fall 2022:

• Build support among the Governor's office and legislature

• January 2023 - April 2023 (budget season!):

- Advocate to ensure Healthy School Meals for All is included in:
 - Executive budget proposal (January)
 - One-house budgets (March)
 - Final budget (April 1)
