






How It Works

- The <u>Summer Food Service Program</u> provides healthy meals & snacks for kids and teens when school is out.
- Locally, summer meals operate through:
 - → Sponsors that manage the program and procure meals.
 - → Sites, where kids get meals.
- At "open" sites, any child or teen 18 and under can drop by for a meal at no cost.
 Other site types include camps or "closedenrolled" sites.





Summer Meal Sites

Summer meal sites must:

- → Serve meals (provided by the sponsor) to kids 18 and under, in safe and sanitary conditions
- → Attend required trainings & fulfill other requirements in their sponsor agreement (e.g., tracking meal counts)
- → Ensure children eat all meals on site, unless approved for non-congregate meals in rural areas
- → Be located in an eligible low-income area (for open sites), meaning ≥50% of the area's children qualify for F/RP school meals
 - Can be determined based on the <u>local school</u> and/or <u>Census data</u> (we can help!)







Growing Summer Meals

- Summer meals are critical for alleviating hunger and summer learning loss, yet pre-pandemic, only 1 in 4 low-income NY kids ate summer meals.
- In many **rural areas**, even fewer kids have access to summer meals.
- New options and proven best practices can help reach more kids this summer.



COVID-19 specific waivers have ended; however, there are new flexibilities starting in summer 2023:


In rural areas without access to congregate sites, approved sponsors can serve non-congregate meals, including grab-and-go and/or home delivery.





Which areas are eligible?

- Must be rural, including:
 - Areas designated rural on <u>USDA's</u> rural designation mapper
 - Other areas if approved by NYSED;
 sponsors with rural "pockets" that are not qualified based on the map can reach out to NYSED
- AND without access to congregate meals



Rural designation = areas <u>not</u> shaded in purple





What types of meal service are allowable?

- Meal pick-up (i.e., grab-and-go, curbside pick-up)
- Home delivery
- Sponsors can be approved to provide up to 7 days-worth of meals


Who can we serve?

- In area eligible locations (50% or more FRE), sponsors can serve & claim meals for <u>all</u> children
- In non-area eligible locations, sponsors can serve & claim meals served to children eligible for free or reduced-price school meals





- Non-congregate options are not applicable to camps or urban areas.
- Sponsors must first be approved for noncongregate meal service by NYSED.
- Keep in mind: USDA's guidance for 2023 is just for this summer; 2024 and beyond may look different.

Successful Non-Congregate Meal Service Models for Rural Areas: Implementation Guide

In approved states beginning summer 2023, Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) and NSLP Seamless Summer Option (SSO) sponsors can operate non-congregate programs in rural communities without access to a congregate meal site. Find more information in <u>USDA's</u> Implementation Guidance for Summer 2023 Non-Congregate Meal Service in Rural Areas.

This resource outlines effective models for non-congregate meal service. Use this guide to find strategies and tactics to execute a successful non-congregate summer meals program in your rural community.

Please reach out to your state agency to confirm the availability of non-congregate meal service and allowable models. Note: States are not required to make the non-congregate option available this summer. State agencies had to submit a plan to USDA for approval by April 1, 2023 to allow non-congregate meal service in summer 2023.



Best Practices: Reaching More Kids & Teens

- Meet kids & families where they already spend time in the summer (e.g., public pools, parks, libraries, housing communities, community centers).
- Pair meals with activities to reduce stigma & make sites more appealing
 - Recreation programs
 - Summer reading programs
- Consider a <u>mobile route</u> with multiple stops view our <u>pre-pandemic summer meals webinar</u> to learn how Gates-Chili CSD converted a bus for mobile meals!
- Collect & incorporate feedback from kids & families.





Best Practices: Connecting Families with Other Supports

- SNAP: <u>Local NOEP Coordinators</u> provide SNAP outreach & free and confidential application assistance.
- **WIC:** Visit the <u>WIC Resource Center</u> for easy-to-use outreach resources in English and Spanish.
- **School Meals:** Use our <u>school meal application</u> <u>toolkit</u> to encourage families to apply.
- Afterschool Meals: Consider serving year-round meals if you operate afterschool programs; <u>learn</u> <u>more here</u>.


